## STANDARD CONDITIONS OF ETHICS APPROVAL

The standard conditions of human research ethics approval are as follows:

- 1) Comply with the *National Statement on Ethical Conduct in Human Research (2007)*, and any legislation relevant to the juristiction that this project is conducted.
- 2) Conduct the project strictly in accordance with the application which was granted ethics approval, including any specific conditions nominated in the ethics approval correspondence.
- 3) Obtain ethics approval for all amendments to an ethics approved project by submitting an Amendment Request Coversheet and relevant supporting documentation.
- 4) Report adverse events as soon as practicable using the Adverse Event Report form. In cases where it is not practicable to complete the form immediately, every effort must be made to report the event via other means, such as phone or email, until such time the form can be submitted.
- 5) Ensure all licences, permits and other approvals are in place, and, as necessary, provide copies to the Safety and Fieldwork team, Academic Support Unit.
- 6) Provide a written progress report every 12 months from the date of approval and on completion of the project.
- 7) Advise if the project is discontinued.
